Parking not easy

Mayor spells out economics of CBD paid parking, as community petitions for change

Access to parking in Wangaratta's CBD and exploration about what free parking might look like remain key concerns for a local business owner set to deliver a 2000 strong petition to council this week calling for change.

Mayor Irene Grant last week verbally reported to council addressing the controversy over the mandatory use of the EasyPark app to pay for parking in the CBD.

She also noted that without parking revenue, council would "either increase rates, reduce services, or compensate for the lost income.

The necessity of paid parking is tied to a contract signed in 2012 that locked council into the construction and ongoing overheads connected to the three-tier Co-store carpark, with the liability ending in 2034.

Council reported there has been a significant uptake in the use of EasyPark to pay for parking in the Wangaratta CBD since July 2025, with more than 14,000 transactions in September 2025 compared to just over 7000 in September 2024 and 8000 in September 2023.

However, Mr Barry said this was bound to happen given it's the only way people can pay for parking

now and the statistic was irrelevant. CBD using EasyPark in 2025 so far is \$0.72 per transaction with an average parking time of 36 minutes.

"Council has provided direct assistance to users to help with the use of the payment system," Cr

> "The community should also be aware there is also free, timed parking around the CBD, Big W, behind the post office and Performing Arts Centre – council is currently is working to improve on-line and physical signage."

Cr Grant noted that the EasyPark app offers a quicker, more flexible

way to manage your parking.

"Users only pay for the time they actually use, which helps avoid overpayment often seen with parking meters," she said.

"Additional benefits include receiving a free reminder before your parking time expires, and you can adjust your parking sessions directly from your device."

Cr Grant said council encourages residents and visitors to share their

experiences with the parking system. She said constructive feedback helps them continue to refine and

improve the service to meet community needs.

Council will continue to monitor how the parking payment system functions and will consider feedback and ways to improve the payment system.

A review report will be prepared for the council in June 2026.



TODDLER, PARENTS UNSCATHED AFTER CAR HITS TREE, ROLLS

A young toddler and their parents escaped injury after their vehicle crashed into a fallen tree and rolled twice on the Hume Freeway near Lilliput on Friday

A Victoria Police spokesperson said around 9:30pm the vehicle crashed into a tree which had just fallen across the road in the northbound lanes between Springhurst and Chiltern.

"The driver unable to avoid the tree (due to its size) has collided with the tree, causing the vehicle to roll two and a half times before coming to rest on its roof in the right-hand lane," they said.

"The two adult occupants managed to free themselves from the vehicle before releasing their baby from their car seat."

Wangaratta and Wodonga Highway Patrol officers attended the scene along with Ambulance Victoria and VICSES.

The police spokesperson said due to the child's car seat being secured correctly and all occupants properly secured in seatbelts, they avoided injury and were sent to Northeast Health Wangaratta for observation only.

"This is a timely reminder of how important it is infants and newborns are correctly restrained at all times in a motor vehicle," they said.

"Seatbelts save lives."

The incident came as police started a five-day blitz on Victorian roads for the Melbourne Cup Day weekend.

A Wangaratta police spokesperson said as of Sunday a large majority of motorists were well-behaved and no outstanding incidents were recorded.

The blitz ends late Tuesday night.

The 37-year-old faced Wangaratta Magistrates' Court from the Metropolitan Remand Centre looking to be bailed last Thursday.

Wangaratta Detective Sergeant Chris Hill said the operation involved undercover operatives who purchased seven firearms and a large quantity of methylamphetamine off the accused between February and April this year.

Wangaratta jockey Brooke Sweeney made a fantastic return to racing yesterday, with backto-back wins at the Wangaratta Motor Group Melbourne Cup Day

Riding David Strain's horse, Kalira, a five-year-old chestnut mare trained by Craig Dickson, in the 1170 metre A & J Perkins Builders Handicap, Sweeney claimed her first win by a full length.

In her next race, race five, the Wangaratta Motor Group Maiden Plate, Sweeney rode Mako Bay, a four-year-old brown mare, to win by a full two lengths in a brilliant run.

Making the back-to-back wins even sweeter for the 21-year-old was the come back victories on her home track after a serious crash in Wodonga back in

"I had to have two months off riding as I recovered," Sweeney

"I started slowly with simple track riding for six weeks, then worked my way back to race riding.

"My race riding was going okay, I still wasn't at 100 per

"My weight was difficult to maintain but with summer coming up, I am finding it easier with the management side of things.

It was also a triumphant return for the local turf club, with the first races at the Wangaratta track since 20 December last year taking place after \$1.5m worth of upgrades in the last 11 months.

Sweeney said the track was in great condition considering the amount of rain it had in the last

"Greg (track manager) has done a terrific job, to get it up and running in the time he had,"

"Having 30mm of rain made the track a bit soft but it was a great track to run."

Sweeney said the two wins were fantastic especially on back-to-back rides.

Race four was particularly special, as Sweeney came back from a slow start on Kalira, heading into the straight very hard.

"I think his first meet here he had 500 people turn up, to have close to 4500 people here today is a magnificent achievement.

"He has done a great job increasing the profile of the day in Wangaratta and building it into a lively place to be."

\$70,000 road safety **boost for North East**

RoadSafe North East has secured approximately \$70,000 in funding through the Victorian Government's Community Road Safety Grants program, paving the way for a suite of targeted initiatives aimed at reducing road trauma across the region.

The grant will support five key program areas: older motorcycle rider safety, off-road motorcycle safety, young driver education, safe cycling, and distraction awareness.

Each initiative is designed to promote behavioural change among road users, with a strong focus on vulnerable groups.

Executive officer Aaron Scales said the funding will allow Road-Safe North East to deliver programs tailored to the needs of local communities.

"All of the programs are designed around behaviour change," he said.

"For example, our distraction program focuses on mobile phone use and other hazards, using variable messaging signs across the region to deliver impactful safety messages."

The motorcycle safety initiative will include on-road training sessions for riders over 40, a group identified as high-risk due to returning to riding after long breaks.

"They're often returning riders who may not have the skills they impacting community engagement.

Mobile services affected while Telstra stations are upgraded

Telstra is upgrading its mobile base station at Gapsted this week, and Wangaratta South next week, temporarily affecting mobile services in the area.

The Gapsted station is being switched off on Wednesday/Thursday (5/6 November) and will be off from 7am to 5pm on Friday, 7 November.

The Wangaratta South station will be switched off for works from Monday to Thursday (10-13 November), with intermittent outages from Friday to Sunday (14-16 November).

Telstra regional general manager Jenny Gray said the upgrades will bring a better 4G/5G user experience by improving the mobile site's capacity, meaning faster downloads, smoother streaming and less congestion.

Telstra said landline services, NBN and satellite internet services, and mobile coverage from other providers will not be impacted during the works and any calls to Triple Zero from a Telstra mobile when the site is off air will automatically connect to another mobile network if available for connection to emergency services.


Telstra customers can continue to make calls and send texts during disruption to mobile services by switching on Wi-Fi Calling.


Most heartening is the admiration they show for those working hard to ensure it remains a drawcard.

Australians with MND deserve equal support

MND Australia is calling for urgent action to end age-based discrimination in care funding for people diagnosed with motor neurone disease (MND).

Every year, hundreds of Australians are diagnosed with MND after turning 65, but instead of receiving the comprehensive and flexible care available under the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS), they are diverted into an aged care system never designed for rapidly progressing, complex neurological conditions.

The result: they are left behind twice, first by a disease that moves faster than any bureaucracy and again by a system that values age

Under the NDIS, a person living with MND can access an average of \$302,000 in annual support.

In stark contrast, those diagnosed after 65 are limited to a maximum of \$108,000 under the new Support at Home Program, leaving a funding gap of nearly \$200,000 every year.

People living with MND aged 65 and over are battling a terminal condition that steals movement, speech and independence, but they are also forced to fight a system that decides their care based not on urgency or need, but on the year they were born.

This inequity is leaving older Australians, their carers and families to shoulder enormous physical, emotional and financial burdens.

In October, a Senate inquiry into aged care delivery sounded the alarm on this widening inequity, echoing MND Australia's

long-held concerns.

The committee's report called for equity to be considered between the NDIS and aged care supports including improved transparency, specialist assessments and an end to the rationing of home care packages, but MND Australia says the government must go further.

MND Australia is urging the Minister for Health and Ageing, Mark Butler, to act on the Senate committee's recommendations and establish a fast-track pathway within aged care for Australians diagnosed with MND after 65.

Unfortunately this alleged fast track is approval within three months.

The NDIS does the same within five working days.

This highlights the unfair two-tiered system of inequity for people living with MND who get diagnosed after aged 65.

Numerous items from the burglary were located with the offenders including a handbag, jewellery and a hard drive containing the Tavern Terrace home CCTV footage.

The defendant was later arrested and charged at her Wodonga home in December last year after police traced mobile phone data and identified her as the owner of the vehi-

She denied her involvement to police and denied being at the house.

The safe containing the \$20,000 coins was never located.

The 55-year-old also pleaded guilty to making multiple fraudulent purchases of \$15,755 worth of power tools and motor oil across the North East.

The court heard from 7 June this year until 17 July, the woman made fraudulent purchases of chainsaws, brush cutters, blowers, a generator and motor oils at retail stores in Wangaratta, Benalla, Shepparton and Numurkah.

The purchases would be made with cheques from a stolen chequebook attributed to an unknown

At each of the transactions the woman told the store cashier she would be making the purchases on behalf of the cheque book owner and all purchases would be declined days later.

On 21 July police searched the woman's Wodonga home to find a Jeep wagon driven by the accused to arrive at retail stores.

Inside the car were three blank stolen cheques and three cash converters pawn tickets.

The woman denied knowledge of the cheque book being stolen and said she was purchasing the items because a friend was starting a gardening business.

Defence counsel Nadia David said her client was under no illusions of the peril she faced for her offending, which was done throughout a period of major depression.

Ms David said the 55-year-old was diagnosed bipolar and had gambling issues.

Magistrate Ian Watkins adjourned sentencing to 20 November and ordered the woman be remanded into custody.




The year 3/4 students are currently studying symmetry and understanding that to be symmetrical, one half of the image or shape is the same as the other side.

Moyhu Tennis Club moves to become a multipurpose hub



Funding support from multiple sources is helping the Moyhu Tennis Club (MTC) move forward with its goal to have its courts remediated and the site developed into a multipurpose sports facility.

The club said it was notified in May by Victorian Treasurer Jaclyn Symes (MLC, Northern Victoria) that it was successful in obtaining a \$41,000 grant through the Regional Development Victoria, Tiny Towns Fund.

Combined with support from Tennis Victoria Places to Play Tennis funding, and a Rural City of Wangaratta community grant of \$5000, the investment has allowed the club to undertake a feasibility study for the upgrade of the Moyhu tennis courts and multipurpose facility.

MTC president Wendy Thorp said the club is currently working with Tennis Victoria, the RCOW recreation team and 2MH Consulting (sport facility design and project management), to complete the scoping project and concept

"We recently engaged with Tennis Victoria to update our strategic plan and once the scoping project is completed we hope to be (as council tells us we need to be) 'shovel ready' to be eligible to apply for major funding," she said.

The big picture is to upgrade all four tennis courts, with two courts overlaid with a netball court and two overlaid with four pickleball courts, a basketball half-court and a hit up wall, all under lights.

"Not only will a multipurpose facility be a great asset for the Moyhu and the surrounding area, it will be a great asset to promote tourism in the King Valley tourism region."

Ms Thorp said the club's tennis programs have commenced for the season, with strong numbers once again across all programs including mini and junior hot shots, teen cardio and adult cardio for both men and women.

In addition, the club has casual Friday night social tennis, with players coming from Wangaratta, Molyullah, Greta, Whitfield, Cheshunt, Oxley, Milawa and the local community.

Make cycle season safe for all region road users

RoadSafe North East is highlighting important drive and ride rules, so motorists and cyclists can all enjoy the roads safely during the cvcle season for the rest of spring and throughout summer.

RoadSafe North East spokesperson Aaron Scales said it's important to promote a mindset of shared respect between bike riders and motorists, particularly during these warmer months, with many bike riders visiting our cycle-friendly region and local cyclists training for upcoming events.

"Bike riders have a right to be on the road and motorists should not be surprised, nor resentful of their presence," he said.

"We strongly urge motorists to take care when they see a cyclist, slow down and when it's safe, allow at least 1.5 metres between the cyclist and your vehicle when passing."

A renewed focus on "Driver Distraction" will be at the core of RoadSafe North East's road safety awareness campaign over the coming months.

The community road safety group is aiming to reactivate its messaging around mobile phone use by drivers and also reminding bike riders, it is illegal to hold a mobile phone when cycling.

Distracted road users pose a major risk to other motorists, as well as vulnerable road users, such as other cyclists and pedestrians.

Concern about the high rates of mobile phone usage by drivers and their attitudes towards these risky behaviours, prompted the group to activate the Driver Distraction campaign right across the region.





Toilet training your puppy

Toilet training a puppy or dog requires patience and consistency.

Every dog learns at their own pace, and it's essential to use reward-based positive reinforcement techniques to encourage the behaviour you want.

Start by giving your dog plenty of opportunities to go outside, especially first thing in the morning, after meals, and frequently throughout the day.

When your dog toilets in the correct spot, immediately reward them with praise, a treat, or a favourite toy.

The reward must occur immediately after the event (within a few seconds), not when the dog comes back inside, as the dog will not make an association between going to the toilet in the right spot and the reward unless it is given straight afterwards.

Supervise your dog closely to catch these moments and reward them promptly.

Look for signs that your dog may need to go, such as sniffing, circling, or pausing in one snot

By learning your dog's signals, you can guide them outside in time.

If your dog has an accident inside, avoid reacting.

Instead, clean the area with a nonammonia-based cleaner to remove odours and the likelihood of the dog using the same place again.

Ignoring indoor accidents helps your dog focus on the positive rewards for going in the right place.

Never punish your dog for accidents, as this can create distress and confusion and may delay progress.

Young puppies may not have full control over their bladder, so be patient as they develop.

With consistency and positive reinforcement, most dogs learn to toilet in the desired location over time.
